
A Letter from Executive Director Evelyn A. Gill




PEI KIDS HONORS PALS

Dutko, Sr., USAF Retired secured the course at McGuire Air Force Base's Falcon Creek Golf Course for our first ever annual golf event, and due to Bob's commitment, we've been there ever since. In 2001 he served as a member of our Capital Campaign Committee which supported our purchase of our present home.

Eunice K. Jadlocki is a founding Board member, serving from 1985-1993, who continues to support the work of the agency. She served as acting executive director and then assistant director following her tenure as a Board member. Leaving PEI Kids as a staff member to start The

Wellness Community of Central NJ, she continued as an event volunteer serving on the Dinner/Auction Committee and Resource Development Committee (RDC) for many years.

Vince J. Scozzari, Jr. was a member of the PEI Kids Board from 1993-2007, serving as president of our Board of Trustees from 1996-1998. He supervised the multiple renovations to our building and was our resident expert on all construction and building repairs. As part of the

committee tasked with changing the agency's name, Vince made sure we kept the children we serve as primary focus during discussions.

Gloria S. Teti served as founding chair of our Resource Development Committee (RDC) and remained in the position for the next 7 years. She chaired the first PEI Kids' Annual Dinner and was the one who encouraged us to start our annual golf event. She also created the Kids' Helping Kids project for children

David B. Thompson also joined the Capital Campaign Committee in 2001 helping to raise the funds needed to purchase our building. When the campaign ended Dave continued his relationship through sponsorships and event attendance. Elaine B. Zeitz was a founding Board member, our second President and our social service conscience. Her legacy lives on through the Zeitz Campership Scholarships which allow PEI Kids to send several underprivileged children to camp each summer.

OUR FUNDERS, WE THANK YOU!

Like many nonprofits, PEI Kids has struggled to secure funding during these uncertain financial times. Fortunately, our longtime funders have continued to support our programs and services. Since our last issue of *Postings*, we

received several grant awards, and we want to take the opportunity to thank these funders for continuing to believe in our mission and our work.

PEI Kids was awarded a Greater Mercer Grant, a competitive program for projects benefiting residents of Mercer County and the immediately adjoining areas of surrounding counties, from The Princeton Area Community Foundation (PACF) to support CJOOS (Comprehensive Juvenile Offenders Outreach Services). PACF is a longtime supporter of PEI Kids' programs, and we are grateful for all they do for our community. PNC Bank generously provided an award to fund PEI Kids' presentations of the "No More Bullies, No More Victims" program in third grade classrooms in the Trenton School District. Because of the award from PNC Bank, approximately 1,000 students will receive the NMB program. The intent of NMB is to assist school districts, like Trenton, in reducing the incidence of bullying and violence in their school community.

In recent months, PEI Kids was the recipient of two grants from the Lawrence Township Community Foundation. The first grant was awarded in the fall to support the Lawrence Township Stationhouse Adjustment Program (LTSHAP), an alternative program for youth who have committed minor crimes that could result in criminal charges Laing filed. The second grant was awarded this spring and will be applied to the costs associated with Lawrence waship residents participating in PEI Kids' Crisis Intervention for Child Victims of Sexual Abuse Program.

Last, but certainly not least, we want to thank The Horizon Foundation for New Jersey for a grant that allows us to provide counseling to children that have been traumatized, suffered a loss and/or showing early signs of depression. The prizon Foundation for New Jersey promotes health, well-being and quality of life in New Jersey's communities. On behalf of PEI Kids, we want to thank all of our funders for continuing to support our programs and services.

her award on April 28 at the banquet at Mercer Oaks.


Jimmy Carter was talking about Marie when he said "Volunteers are not paid not because they are worthless but because they are priceless." You are priceless to us, Marie!!!
